What is UCAT?

UCAT (previously known as UKCAT) stands for University Clinical Aptitude Test. To enter most medical schools in the United Kingdom, you will need to succeed in the UCAT. The UCAT is a two hour computer based test consisting of multiple-choice questions. It is divided into four separately timed subtests: Verbal Reasoning, Decision Making, Quantitative Reasoning and Situational Judgement.

You will need to sit the UCAT if you are interested in applying for most medical and dental courses across the United Kingdom.

How can I register to sit UCAT?

You are required to complete a two-step process using the Pearson VUE online registration system to register and then book a test. Further details are available at www.ucat.ac.uk

15 October 2025

You can sit UCAT in the time between year 12 and year 13 and then any year thereafter.

Do I need to prepare for UCAT?

Yes! The UCAT is a skills based test which is completely different to any other test you have sat at school. It is a very difficult, time pressured exam.
